

Margaret Burt, Esq., a Rochester-area child welfare attorney, has been a passionate defender of children and their rights over a span of many years. The recipient of several prestigious awards in recognition for her hard work and contributions, she has been awarded the Juvenile Justice Award by the Women's Bar Association of the State of New York (WBASNY) in honor of her unflagging advocacy for children and her longstanding efforts to protect their rights and assure them fair representation over the entire course of her legal career.

In addition to providing legal help for children, Ms. Burt has also provided consultation and training on the subject of child welfare issues to other legal professionals as well as to child welfare staff members across the state who must be kept informed of the most current legal mandates regarding custody and adoption. Ms. Burt has been a guest speaker at numerous convocations at both state and national levels, where she is frequently called upon to share her knowledge, insights, and expertise. Her audiences have been very responsive, and she is widely known for her insightful observations, quick wit, and ready willingness to share the benefits of her extensive research and experience.

Prescription Drugs and Opiate Abuse: Overview of the Current Epidemic

Prescription drug abuse, especially of opioid pain killers and anti-anxiety medications, are driving a major epidemic that affects the entire population either directly or indirectly. This workshop will provide an overview of the increase in prescription drug abuse since 2000. Opioid prescriptions have increased by over 400% in the US since the late 1990s. The prescription drug abuse epidemic is also fueling a large increase in the use of street heroin. Participants will consider possible implications of this drug abuse epidemic for child and family welfare, including placement, treatment, and permanency planning.

Taking the "Telling" Out of Training

Learning can be fun, innovative, and transforming. This workshop is designed for anyone who teaches, trains, or leads workshops. It will focus on: how to build a safe learning environment where fun and creativity can occur based on the process of facilitation instead of training, and promoting participants' thinking instead of the teacher/trainer/workshop leader simply telling them information. The best facilitators start with the student, not with themselves. Planning should not be what the facilitator will do, but what the facilitator hopes the participants will learn. During this workshop we will provide strategies and techniques for creating a safe, funfilled, situational learning environment, while maintaining your curriculum objectives.

Providing Support to Traumatized Children (Mini TOT)

Traumatic events shatter children's beliefs about the world and their safety, and they make children feel powerless and out of control. Behaviors and feelings related to the trauma of abuse and neglect threaten children's overall well-being and become challenges to achieving permanency. This train-the-trainer workshop will prepare participants to deliver a two-hour training to foster parents on supporting and nurturing children who have experienced trauma, beginning from the time that a child or youth first enters foster care.

What are the obligations of the child welfare professionals? What are the role and duties of the child's lawyer? And what are the rights of parents?

Preventing Disruptions: A Foster Parent's Perspective

Don't stop believin', hold on to that feelin'! When foster parents request removal of older children from their care, all too often the agency staff concludes that there is no choice but to immediately find another placement. A parent who has successfully fostered and adopted more than 20 older children will share his real-life experiences and offer a new and powerful perspective: it is the attitude of caseworkers and homefinders, not strategies or solutions, that makes the biggest impact in successfully preventing disruptions. This workshop will offer tips for homefinders to effectively support foster parents at the very beginning of the "Stages of Disruption" as introduced in Meeting 7 of GPSII/MAPP.

Options for Kinship Caregivers

In the last decade, the percentage of children being raised by grandparents or other relatives has dramatically increased in New York State. Unlike foster parents, many caregivers who assume responsibility for their grandchildren or other kin are not prepared to raise these often traumatized children. Relative caretakers often experience difficulties navigating the social and human services systems in an attempt to obtain services for their grandchildren and other kin, thereby forgoing the vital supports that could help provide a safe and stable home for these children. This workshop will provide an overview of the benefits and options available to kinship caregivers, and how those working with these families can support them in an effort to link them with needed services.


