Group Preparation and Selection II/Model Approach to Partnerships in Parenting (GPS II/MAPP)

Leader Certification Workshops

GPSII/MAPP is a program that helps prospective foster and adoptive parents make informed, mutual decisions with agency about whether foster parenting or adopting is right for their family.

Participants in the Leader Certification Workshops are prepared to co-lead the ten 3-hour meetings in the GPSII/MAPP program as well as to use family consultations and other tools of the program. All certified GPSII/MAPP leaders are also qualified to conduct Mini-MAPP.

A Spanish language version of the GPSII/MAPP curriculum is made available to certified GPS II/MAPP Leaders.

How to Use GPSII/MAPP:

The ten meetings are designed to be offered sequentially by at least two leaders once a week along with the other tools of the program including family self-assessments, individual family consultations, and written development plans.

Deciding Together/MAPP (DT/MAPP)

Leader Certification Workshops

An alternative to GPSII/MAPP, Deciding Together provides a comprehensive preparation and mutual selection process for *individual* prospective foster and adoptive families who cannot participate in group meetings. Deciding Together can also be used by smaller agencies that do not have sufficient numbers of participants to make GPSII/MAPP a viable option.

Through these workshops, GPSII/MAPP leaders will learn how to work closely with the individual families using six parent guidebooks.

How to Use DT/MAPP:

A special feature of the Deciding Together is its high degree of flexibility and adaptability. Leaders assign parts of the parent guidebooks for prospective foster /adoptive parents to complete prior to the consultations and reserve other activities in the guidebooks to complete with the family during consultations. The guidebooks are designed to allow individuals to proceed at their own pace. Prospective foster/adoptive parents and leaders can work out a mutually satisfactory schedule for at least seven consultations that are recommended to review the six guidebooks.

Each family should be given at least one week to complete each book.

COMPASS-FYI (First Year In-Service)

Leader Certification Workshops

COMPASS-FYI is an activity oriented and skills-based in-service training program designed for foster parents who have been certified through GPSII/MAPP. The program is composed of nine 3-hour sessions that build on the concepts introduced in GPSII/MAPP and focus on developing skills that foster parents use in everyday family life.

Through these workshops, certified GPSII/MAPP leaders learn how to facilitate the COMPASS-FYI program.

How to Use COMPASS-FYI:

It is recommended that the first three sessions are delivered in sequence so that foster parents will have the foundation skills and information to be used in the remaining six sessions. All nine sessions also have a "stand alone" delivery option.

Shared Parenting/MAPP (SP/MAPP)

Leader Certification Workshops

Research indicates that the relationship between birth parents and foster parents predicts an important amount of success of permanency planning and well-being of the child. Shared Parenting offers 8 inservice training meetings that help foster parents to build essential skills for working effectively with birth parents in support of child safety, permanency, and well-being. Leaders will learn how to create an effective learning environment that meets the needs of experienced foster parents and how to model and apply the Strengths Approach in developing foster parenting skills.

How to use SP/MAPP:

Each meeting may be conducted as a stand-alone 2 or 3 hour session, or the 8 meetings can also be delivered sequentially, building upon the skills of each prior meeting.

Fostering and Adopting the Child Who Has Been Sexually Abused/MAPP (CSA/MAPP)

Leader Certification Workshops

Studies suggest that many children in out-of-home care have experienced some form of sexual abuse. Often foster and adoptive parents are not adequately prepared for the disruptive behaviors of sexually abused children, nor are they prepared to address the child's disclosure of earlier sexual abuse. This 12-meeting in-service training program helps foster and adoptive parents develop the skills necessary to respond to the double trauma that children experience from being sexually abused and removed from their birth families. Leaders will learn how to create a safe and constructive training environment where sensitive issues can be discussed openly.

The first 5 "meetings" of the program are the "Core" meetings which are designed to meet the basic needs of foster/adoptive parents in understanding and meeting the needs of children who have been sexually abused.

The additional 7 meetings are "optional" meetings which are designed to meet the advanced needs of children who have been sexually abused

How to Use CSA/MAPP:

The first five "core" meetings provide basic information on child sexual abuse. The remaining seven "advanced topic" meetings build on this foundation and offer a flexible design from which the parents or the agency may select in any order to most effectively meet their needs.

Caring for Our Own/MAPP (CFOO/MAPP)

Leader Certification Workshops

Caring for Our Own is an educational/group support program for relative/kinship caregivers. Through nine meetings, relative caregivers are provided with information about services and resources available, receive support from other caregivers, develop ongoing support networks, build skills to better parent the children in their homes, and learn to manage and enhance their relationship with birth parents and agencies. Leaders will learn how to effectively create and support a support group environment.
