1. A Parent's Perspective on Living with Attachment Issues

This workshop will focus on the challenges that children, in foster care, bring to the foster home when their attachment has been interrupted. Attachment occurs on a continuum—from secure to disorganized and parental interaction influences attachment styles. We will look at those attachment styles and determine how breaking the trust cycle impacts the development of attachment styles. After examining why attachment needs arise, we will identify how foster parents can aid a child's healing process. Get firsthand parenting tips from someone who has walked in your shoes.

This workshop will speak to the unique needs of relative caregivers and the challenges they confront. We will also discuss "Transitional Issues" for them, as relative caregivers. Lastly, we will identify strategies to address the transitional issues while maintaining the focus on keeping children safe, working towards permanency, and meeting their needs.
